#### Friends of Bildeston

Here are the main points of the meeting held at the Surgery on 2nd March.

- FOBS agreed to fund the purchase of another ECG machine for the surgery at a cost of approx. £1,500. The surgery has found that as a result of COVID, patients have not always followed up on issues around their general health and now, as things begin to open up again, more underlying issues are beginning to materialise. The surgery is currently carrying out about 60 ECGs each month and a backlog is beginning to develop. Also hospitals are increasingly asking for patients to have had an ECG before certain referrals can be made.
- The staff at the surgery are keen to restart the Patient Participation Group (PPG). The group has not met for a couple of years and in that time people have moved away etc. The group meet once every 3 months and discuss how the surgery is working, their attitudes towards the surgery and how patients' needs and requirements can be met. It is good practice for surgeries to have a PPG especially during CQC inspections. If you are interested in joining the group or would like more information, please telephone the surgery.
- We also discussed fundraising activities and it was agreed that we would have a table at the Whatfield Table Top sale. Hopefully this event would have happened by the time you read this.

The next meeting will be held on 12th May.

Spring Forward, Fall Back. That's the nice easy (American!) way to remember how to rearrange our clocks for British Summer Time. I hope you are enjoying that extra hour of evening light, even if we did all lose an hour at the end of March. Summer beginning in the middle of Lent doesn't seem quite right, and there is a level of hubris in the idea that we can just declare it summer, and it will be so! My father was a diplomat and used to say that the hour change affected him far more than dealing with jetlag and time differences around the world, and I infuriate my family by refusing to adjust to the new time for several days. It doesn't help that half the clocks in my life change automatically, and the other half need a degree in computer science to alter.

The 330 million residents of the United States will no longer have this problem, as it looks likely that from 2023 it will be summer all year round, as they make Daylight Saving time (as they call it) permanent. This does mean that they will never get back the hour they lose, and here it would mean darkness until past 9am some winter days. No more fiddling with clocks though, and more daylight each evening. I can see the attraction.

Easter this year is late - almost as late as it can be, so instead of a dawn service the faithful will gather at Brettenham at 8.30pm on the Saturday evening before as it gets dark, to declare that, in the words of the Easter Exsultet hymn: "this is the night that Jesus vanquished hell, broke the chains of death, and rose triumphant from the grave". Time will indeed spring forward for us, as we are taken up into the worship of the angels in heaven, and capture a glimpse of the new creation that Christ has won for us. Whatever we are going through, whether bereavement, poverty, sickness or depression, the Easter story can break through, and give us hope that things will one day be as they should be. In Ukraine, Orthodox Christians will be celebrating Easter a week later on the 24th April, I presume in a more restricted and subdued fashion to their normal festivities, if there is not a ceasefire in place by then. Those brave people will have to hang on longer

for their Easter this year than the rest of us, but it is coming.

The Exsultet hymn goes on to say: "This is the night, that gave us back what we had lost". We might not get our hour of sleep back soon, but because of Christ's victory over death, one day Eternity itself will be ours again.

#### **Recipe Page**

#### **Hot Cross Bun Recipe from Michelle Harvey**

#### **Ingredients**

250ml Milk

55g butter

14g dried yeast

450g bread flour

1 tsp salt

1 tsp Mixed Spice

1 tsp Cinnamon

1 tsp Nutmeg

55g Sugar

1 large egg

100g Mixed dried fruit (Sultanas, cranberries raisins)

1 just and peel from a satsuma

Honey to glaze





#### Method

In a small bowl warm the milk and butter until luke warm. Add the yeast and mix.

In a separate bowl mix the flour, salt, spice and sugar. Whisk the egg and add to the flour mixture with the milk butter and yeast. Mix well.

Knead for 10 mins.

Add the dried fruit and knead for a further 2 mins.

Divide into 12 balls and put onto baking trays. Warm the honey and brush over the top of the buns. Cut a cross in the top. Leave to rise until they double in size.

Place in an oven 190 C/ 375F/ Gas mark 5 for 15 - 20 mins until golden brown. Allow to cool on a wire rack.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

You are invited to attend the Annual Parish Meeting but what is it?

There can be, and often is, confusion between the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual General Meeting of the parish council. All parish and town councils throughout England are required by law to hold an Annual Parish Meeting, which must take place between 1st March and 1st June (inclusive). Meetings should not commence before 6.00pm. Brettenham's parish meeting is on **Thursday 14th April at 7.30pm.** 

What is the purpose of the Annual Parish Meeting?

The purpose of the meeting is for the parish council and other local organisations to explain what they have been doing over the last year. It also enables the electors to have their say on anything they consider is important to the people of the parish.

Who can attend the meeting?

It is a meeting for all electors of the parish and not a meeting of the parish council. Anyone may attend but only registered electors of the parish may speak and vote during the meeting.

Who will chair the meeting?

The chair of the parish council chairs the meeting.

Will I be able to ask questions and make suggestions?

Any registered elector may ask questions, which will usually be answered by the chair, clerk or a designated councillor. An elector may also make suggestions and comments on anything pertinent to the people of the parish. This will be welcomed and is the whole purpose of the meeting.

Will councillors be there?

All councillors representing the parish will be invited to attend. Councillors can also raise questions and make comments if they wish. However, the purpose of the meeting is to enable the ordinary electors to find out what is going on in their parish and to have their say.

Will notes be taken of the meeting?

Yes, the parish clerk takes minutes.

How long will the meeting last?

It really depends on those present, the number of questions and the discussion that is raised.

#### The Suffolk Walking Festival returns

Tickets are on sale now for The Suffolk Walking Festival as it returns in 2022 for its 14<sup>th</sup> instalment.

The festival, which launches on 14 May 2022 at Clare Country Park, boasts over 70 guided walks that will take you across wild countryside, outstanding landscapes, rolling hills, forests, and coastal beauty spots. With lots of weekend, evening and family walks. The programme has accessible, short, medium, long-distance walks, and more challenging walks — so there is something for everyone.

This year's programme will discover a dragon in the iconic Stour Valley, explore Hawkedon's horizons through idyllic green villages, celebrate 75 years at RSPB, tell stories of smugglers and shipping routes at Dunwich Heath, and spend time watching Sweep the sheepdog in action managing Orford Ness Nature Reserve's very own herd of rare breed sheep.

You can tune into bats on a twilight safari through ancient woodland at Priestley Wood, brush up your whittling skills and make damper bread over an open fire in the woods at Thornham Walks, and get crafty at Brandon Country Park finding willow, sticks, leaves and rushes in the woods to make and keep your own creations.

# Councillor Paul West, Suffolk County Council's cabinet member for Ipswich, operational highways and flooding, said:

"It is a fantastic achievement to see The Suffolk Walking Festival reach its fourteenth year, holding its title as one of the longest running festivals of its kind in the UK. It is unfortunate that the festival in 2020 had to be cancelled, and in 2021 it took place virtually; so it is very exciting to see the festival return in full.

"The festival grows in popularity each year with its vast variety of walks and events. It shows off some of Suffolk's most beautiful scenery which makes up part of the 3,500 miles of public rights of way across the county.



#### **Nature Notes**

We are now entering the season when our bird numbers are greatly increased by visitors from abroad.




<u>Blackcaps</u> fly from the Mediterranean and nest in hedges and brambles. The male has a black cap and the female a chestnut cap.







Nightingales have declined about 91% in 40 years. East Anglia is one of the few remaining areas where they might be heard. They nest in thick bushes and deep undergrowth so are very hard to spot. They are one of the few birds that sing at night.





<u>Turtle Doves</u> are another species that have declined greatly in numbers over the years. They arrive from Sub-Saharan Africa and, if you are lucky, can be spotted in woodland edges, hedgerows and open land.





<u>Willow Warblers</u> are often confused with Chiffchaffs. The best way to identify them is to look at their legs. Willow warblers have pale legs and Chiffchaffs have black legs. They make the long journey from South Africa and can often be seen and heard in woodland.

Chiffchaffs nest close to the ground and so are vulnerable to predation from stoats, weasels and domestic cats. They are often early arrivals to our shores after travelling from Southern Europe and North Africa. Like most of our summer visitors they eat predominantly insects.



Good luck at spotting these summer visitors. They add another dimension to our summers in Suffolk.

#### **Rambling with Gus**

Bildeston loop: approx. 3 miles, approx. 1 hour 15 minutes, starts at Bildeston Market Place.

Once again, this walk shows that you do not have to go far to find good walks locally. Most of the walk is on grassy paths along the field headlands with a couple of short stretches on quiet roads.


From the market place, head along the road back towards Brettenham. Just as you are exiting Bildeston, on the right-hand side of the road, by the village sign, there is a footpath that takes you on a gentle incline along a grassy path along the side of the field.



After approx. a mile where a path joins from the left, keep right and head towards Fenn Farm. From Fenn Farm follow the farm track towards Gypsy Hall. Before you reach Gypsy Hall, by a small cottage, take the path to the right along Clayhill Lane. Clayhill Lane starts as a track but becomes a road, which eventually joins the Wattisham to Bildeston road at a T junction by the Wattisham Stone. The Wattisham Stone is an odd shaped sandstone boulder located on the lefthand verge of the road. According to locals, the stone turns round when it hears the chimes from the clock tower in Bildeston market place.

At the T junction, turn right and walk a short distance until you find a footpath sign on your right. Take this path, which will lead you back into the village of Bildeston. The walk is listed on the OS online maps as Gus's Bildeston Ramble.

#### **Motoring Memories, Part X**

Stuart's motoring memories are drawn from his childhood in the 1960s and 70s growing up in Bretttenham where his Father ran a village shop and filling station.

#### **Classic Car Shows and Rallies**

Old cars look and sound more interesting, but they also smell more interesting, those real petrol fumes and of course, the interiors, many of which had leather seats.

For many years I have enjoyed going to the Classic Car shows. The Ipswich to Felixstowe Run is one of my favourites. Up to 500 vehicles leave Christchurch Park Ipswich and make their way to park up at the prom at Felixstowe. These include cars, commercial vehicles, motorcycles, military vehicles, bicycles and even lawnmowers as well as prams. It is delightful to watch them as they make their way to the coast.

Helmingham Hall is another of my favourites; again, well in excess of 500 vehicles and many clubs having their own displays. Twice, during the day, a number of cars will be driven and a commentary provided about the vehicle including an interview with the driver. Seeing and hearing the vehicles is great.

Some years ago, Lavenham used to host a car show in conjunction with the Carnival, this was called the Rare Breeds show. There would be up to 100 or so cars to look around. I well recall being there when a thunder storm hit, it was a case of quickly taking shelter in the tea tent...not a bad place to go. It took place last year and there are already plans in place for this year. It is now called Lavenham Classics and takes place at August Bank Holiday.

Locally Great Waldingfield has had a rally organised by Monks Eleigh Bygones Club. This is an enjoyable event with perhaps more emphasis on such things as farm vehicles and stationary engines. However, it did not take place in 2020.

One rally which has a superb setting took place at Melford Hall. The vehicles in the foreground and the hall in the background made a great vista. This was a show with the focus on farm machinery and organised by the Farm Machinery Preservation Society. Often there were displays with perhaps a traction engine and threshing tackle. There were many interesting exhibits with quite a few of the machines being rather unusual but it has not taken place since 2017.

Some years ago, I enjoyed attending a small show in Ufford near Woodbridge, this was mainly a village show with some classic cars but was a very pleasant friendly show; often different vehicles could be seen which could not be seen elsewhere.

Another small village show is at Bardwell, Cars on the Green. This is quite a busy show with exhibits packed in around the green. On the day I visited the church was open and it was possible to access the tower to enjoy the views of the countryside.

One of largest shows in Suffolk now is Cars by The Lake. This has been going since 2009 and has raised £330,000 for the St Nicholas Hospice. There are usually in excess of 500 vehicles and lots of stalls selling a variety of items including some very tasty pies and macaroons. A couple of years ago I was intrigued to see a Daf 33 and a Daf 44 exhibited. I had not seen either of these cars for some 40 years so it was a quite a surprise.

Last year the show did not take place and it is unclear if there are plans for this year.

The only show I managed to get to last year was at Glenham Hall. There were plenty of vehicles and it was possible to chat to owners as it was not too busy. A former resident of Brettenham, Michael Hipperson, was there promoting his third book. His family formerly lived at The Old Rectory and he and his brother used to drive through the village in some amazing sports cars, well before the existing 30mph speed limit. At least the cars were usually loud enough to make people aware that they were around. Michael has written three books now and has raised over £20,000 for the children's hospice in Essex.

The South Suffolk show based at Ingham generally has classic cars starting a trip from the show ground and returning later in the day to drive around the ring. There are often several rare vehicles there. One which caught my attention was the Lancia Aprilla built between 1937-49. In my view a great looking car.

Peterborough has the British

Leyland show. It is interesting to see how well kept some of the cars are and that despite being over 50 years old they are still in showroom condition; in fact, probably better as the owners will have restored them to a higher than original standard. One particular car, an Austin A40 owned by a friend of mine, was in immaculate condition. Not a spec of dirt anywhere, the engine was so clean it looked as though it had never been started.

Truck fest is a large show again taking place in Peterborough. Looking at the lorries arriving and leaving is quite a spectacle; many of them have customised liveries and are moving works of art.

I enjoy the older commercial lorries and buses and the town of Whittlesey has an annual bus festival. Up to thirty buses assemble in the town, some up to fifty years old. A really enjoyable aspect is that the buses travel between various towns where there are other events such as a display of classic cars. Part of the attraction is travelling on these old buses and being literally transported back to an earlier time. It brings back memories of travelling to school on the various buses.


