Bin Collections over the Festive Season and Christmas Tree Recycling

Recycling/blue bin: no collection Fri 31st Dec, will be collected instead on Wed 5th Jan. And no collection on Fri 14th Jan, will be collected instead on Tues 17th Jan.

Refuse/black bin: no collection Fri 7th Jan, will be collected instead on Tues 11th Jan. And no collection on Fri 21st Jan, will be collected instead on Sat 22nd Jan.

Garden waste/brown bin: no collections during weeks commencing 27th Dec and 3rd Jan.

From Monday 24th January 2022 refuse and recycling collections return to the normal schedule.

Recycling Christmas Trees

During January, you can leave your real Christmas tree, with all decorations removed, beside your brown bin on collection day. Trees must be under 7ft tall, or have a trunk less than 7cm. Bigger Ernie Update

Hi everyone,

It will soon be time to renew Bigger Ernie subscriptions for 2022 (and it's never too early!), or indeed join for the first time.

For the benefit of any "newbies", Bigger Ernie is Brettenham's village lottery - the cost is a meagre £12 per year per ticket, and you can purchase as many subscriptions as you like. There are monthly draws with first, second and third prizes - the amounts are still to be determined from 2022, but the prizes in 2021 were £30, £15 and £10. There are also two bonus draws, normally in June and December, the prizes for 2021 were a whopping £100, £60 and £40! The more subscriptions we get the bigger the prize pot!

50% of the funds raised are allocated to prizes and 50% contribute to BVA funds. The latter forms a vital part of helping to maintain the village hall and contribute towards BVA activities and events. The draws are made at the monthly Friday Village Inn, with results being published in the monthly magazine.

I am taking over the co-ordinator role from Ray Latimer, who did a great job of bringing the whole process into the 21st Century, so thanks Ray for all your work! There are 3 different ways to renew or join, I will start with the easiest – option 1:

Bank transfer – make it payable to 'Brettenham Village Association', Sort Code 52-30-31, Account No. 49882120. Once you have made the payment, please email **biggerernie@outlook.com** stating the bank transfer date, number of tickets purcahsed, ticket holder names and total amount.

Cheque – if you have a normal Bigger Ernie collector then pass your cheque to them along with the ticket holder names; alternatively place your cheque along with this information into an envelope and post it through the letterbox of 29B The Street. Cheques should be made payable to 'Brettenham Village Association'.

Cash – as above if you have a normal Bigger Ernie collector then pass them the cash along with the ticket holder names; alternatively place the cash along with this information into an envelope and post it through the letterbox of 29B The Street.

Christmas is coming, and (famous last words) it looks like it will be a relatively normal Christmas after all. Some shortages in the shops, some things selling out a bit sooner than usual, but other than that, pretty much what we'd normally expect. As some may remember I'm a bit of a humbug usually, but this year I'm making an exception, and looking forward to it!

One of the annual moans made by vicars and non-vicars alike is how "consumerist" Christmas has become. It's all about spending money, overeating and drinking, and buying stuff you don't need. Of course, we tend to be on to our third mince pie of the sitting whilst we say this, having put back a few mulled wines. We all hear the stories from grandma about being lucky to get an orange in your stocking from Santa back in the good old days, but even grandma has got an iPad now.

There's certainly an irony that Cop26 finishes the day I am writing this, a conference for the world's greatest economies to work out how to avoid the increasing warming of the climate due to our greed and consumption. We live in a rural area where most homes are heated by oil and homes often have multiple cars, my own included, where just to live our lives and

heat our homes comes with a significant carbon cost, before we start totting up all the Christmas things we buy and throw out every year. There are loud voices telling us to drive less, fly less, breed less, buy less and eat less. Sometimes these voices can be so shrill, hypocritical and judgemental that they have quite the opposite effect. We should of course seek to reduce our consumption, seek moderation where possible, and make ethical choices for the sake of the environment, but this is only ever going to scratch the surface of the problem. What is needed is wholesale systematic reform, which doesn't rely on getting everyone to make sacrifices and limit their freedoms long term, because if we waited for that, we'd be waiting a long time. We've tried it for much of the last 18 months, and it was bad enough even knowing it was only temporary. Of course, people are going to continue to see their family and friends, buy food they enjoy, visit far off places, and exchange gifts at Christmas. We need to find ways to do all of these things without destroying our planet or our economy, and believe it or not we've made great strides already, and net zero by 2050 is looking increasingly likely.

Christians should be concerned about the environment because we believe God put humankind on the earth to steward it and enjoy it. We've managed to royally mess that up even before we discovered oil, but it's nonetheless our role. But we also believe that this world is not our permanent home, and we are looking forward to our home yet to come. One day God will remake this earth, a world without death or decay, without war or envy or pain. We will eat and drink freely of its bounty, and no one will have less than they need, as all will have an abundance. The new creation is often depicted in the bible as a great wedding feast, a celebration like no other. May all your Christmases be the same this year!

Christmas Services

Last year our Christmas services were very different, as we were still under restrictions around numbers, congregational singing and mask wearing, and of course cases rose in our area leading to many services being cancelled. The Challenges Facing Gardeners Now and In The Future Part 6

"Pesticides" is the umbrella term for hundreds of different active substances designed to kill plants (herbicides), insects (insecticides) and mould and fungus (fungicides).

All these pesticides are sprayed over many of the foodstuffs grown by farmers and we may use some of them in our gardens too. Multiple applications of different pesticides can be made in a growing season. Winter wheat in some countries for example, may have around fifteen chemicals applied to it during its growing season.

Each year the UK Government tests a range of produce and other food stuffs for pesticide residues. This sounds good but it only provides a tiny snapshot in time and not all foodstuffs are tested each year. The Pesticide Action Network UK has taken data published by the Expert Committee on Pesticide Residues in 2018 and 2019 and drawn up a dirty dozen of foodstuffs found to contain multiple residues of pesticides. Here are some examples showing the % of samples with multiple residues. Grapefruit 99%, Strawberries 89%, Pre-packed salad 81%, Pears 66%, Spinach 57%, Apples 52% and Blackberries and Blueberries 51%.

On the other hand, as the world population increases, currently around 7.9 billion and estimated to increase to 8.8 billion in the next fourteen years, there is clearly a need to produce more and more food. Despite the fact that it is generally accepted there is enough food produced to feed everyone on the planet. That however, is a political and logistical issue for another day. Currently it is argued and agreed that pesticides do have an important role to play in the world production of food. For example, Chlormequat reduces the height of wheat, making it more robust and easier to harvest and pesticides are used in huge quantities to try and control the locust swarms in East Africa and the Arabian Peninsula each year. The situation in Africa has worsened this year because COVID has restricted the movement of pesticides, equipment and personnel resulting in a complete failure of many of the crops in these vast areas.

Next month I will talk about what we can do to reduce the use of pesticides in our gardens.

Motoring Memories, Part VI

Stuart's motoring memories are based on his childhood in the 1960s and 70s growing up in Brettenham where his Father ran a village shop and filling station. In this month's episode, Stuart is stopped by the police and ponders on the all important question of what he is looking for in a car ...

Occasionally Mr Pine, who was a local author, would ask me to drive him using his car. This was a Daf 33. The advertising motto was forward to go forward and back to go back. This car had a small engine and was slow and uncomfortable. Daf also produced a larger model too called Daf 44 and these were even rarer. The company was eventually taken over by Volvo.

During a visit home, on this particular day, my father was going to Ipswich and invited me to drive his car a Rover 2000TC. I was keen to drive it as I had not driven one before. On the way to Ipswich, we were stopped by the police. The road tax had expired so the car was illegal. As I was driving, I was responsible. My Father was keen to enter into a "debate" with the police and to explain that I did not know the tax was out of date which may have not been helpful, so I humbly admitted the offence and we were allowed to move on. I was wondering what really makes a good car. A couple of cars which I have owned which seem to tick this box were an Opel Ascona and a Vauxhall Cavalier. The Opel was the German version of the Cavalier, about 15 years separated the time between each. The Opel was a 1600cc petrol four door saloon. One of recollections is of driving to Dinorwig in the Snowdonia region of North Wales. At the time of going there the hydro power station

was being constructed. The journey took around 6 hours with occasional stops. On arrival I felt as comfortable as when I started out. The seats were supportive and comfortable. All of the instruments were easily seen at all times, the gear lever and brake were within easy reach and operated with minimal effort, the pedals were well positioned and light to use. The

performance was adequate with sufficient power to call on if needed. The boot was a good size. Fuel economy was also very reasonable for a car of that size. Some years later I had a 1989 Vauxhall Cavalier 2.0 litre petrol. This had the same qualities as the Opel and was extremely comfortable with good fuel economy of 40miles per gallon range which at that time was good. I have to include a Vauxhall Chevette in my discussion here. This car was the only one which I sold for the same amount I had bought it, £200. I had used

it for 3 months and took it back to the garage who happily purchased it back.

I have enjoyed a number of other Vauxhall's, I had a Cavalier 2.0 litre SRi. This was the performance version of the Cavalier with 130bhp. The suspension was quite firm and it lacked the comfort and

economy of the first Cavalier. I then went for the larger Vauxhall Carlton. This was a large comfortable car with self-levelling suspension and with rear wheel drive. The handling was confidence inspiring and this was an enjoyable car to drive. I would have liked to experience the Lotus Carlton, a top speed of 177mph and at the time was certainly one of the fastest saloon cars around. One of the car dealers in Norfolk (Sandles) used one for his personal transport and it was displayed at his car lot, but then he also travelled regularly to car auctions in his helicopter.

I suspect that a Lotus Carlton would now be very valuable at around £60,000 and collectible.



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
