Easter is finally here! I know what you are thinking: Easter was last month! You'd be right, but Easter is also this month, lasting as it does 50 days. That's because for 40 days Jesus spent time with his disciples after his resurrection, at one point appearing to over 500 people at once. If you think

the idea of someone coming back from the dead is impossible, you'd be in good company, as so did the people of the middle east in the 1st century. And it is impossible for us, but nothing is impossible for God.

The resurrection of Jesus is not just an impressive trick, it is what Christians mean when they talk about eternal life. We believe that life is something physical, something real, and that when God made us with bodies he said "It is good" not "Oops I made a mistake". Death and decay are what robs us of our bodies, and this is a terrible, awful thing. In rising with a new body, never to die again, Jesus made a way for us to do the same.

In Stanley Spencer's wonderful artword there are multiple imaginings of what this will look like, on the day of resurrection. People seeming to wake from sleep from their graves in an English churchyard, talking and laughing and doing their hair! Theologians have spent the last two millenia discussing what form our resurrection bodies will take: will we be eternally young, and if so, what age? Will we be gendered, will we bear the scars of our old life, will we still be authentically us? Research has shown that a butterfly can remember some things from their time as a caterpillar - despite being totally liquified in the cocoon. The bible says

"we shall not all sleep, but we shall be changed".

We continue to celebrate Easter right up until Christ's ascension after 40 days, and then there's 10 days until Pentecost, which coincides with the Queen's jubilee. As we give thanks for her many years of service, we also give thanks that, for those who trust in Jesus Christ, death is not the end, and life will continue in all its fullness, free from pain, from misery and suffering. 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#### **Recipe Page**

#### **Cheesy Pasta (15 mins)**

Ingredients:

250ml milk

20g butter

250g Penne pasta

1 tsp salt

1 Small onion

3 cloves garlic

1 Large tomato

150g strong cheddar cheese

Optional extras: - 25g grated cheese, breadcrumbs, bacon or chorizo

#### Method

- \* In a small bowl warm the milk and butter until lukewarm
- Add the pasta and allow to slowly cook keep stirring
- \* Whilst the pasta is cooking, chop the onion, garlic and tomato (bacon or Chorizo can also be added as extra)
- Cook in a little butter in a large frying pan
- When the pasta is cooked, add the pasta and milk to the frying pan
- Grate the cheese and add to the pasta
- Stir until the cheese has melted
- Optional sprinkle with extra cheese and breadcrumbs and grill until golden brown
- Lovely served with garlic bread





#### A Magical Evening at Hitcham Church

What a nostalgic evening it was when a few weeks ago, All Saints Church in Hitcham was lit by a magnificent display of Victorian oil lamps, as seen in grand houses and practical workplaces.

The newly hung bells were rang by both novice and experienced ringers, as well as some of the visitors that had a chance to try their hand, while Marie played the organ.

This event gave me the opportunity to demonstrate my oil lamp illuminated "Victorian Magic Lanterns", showing hand-painted



slides, slip slides and chromatropes (slides with geometric patterns that move). Some of the slides date back to the early 18th century and were of great interest to both the young and old.

Oil, or paraffin as it was more commonly known, was a great household commodity during the 19th century, being used for both cooking and lighting. Most shops and hardware stores sold paraffin loose i.e. it would be measured into the customer's own cans. The larger stores did home deliveries of paraffin and goods. At one time, Hicks at Hitcham had two vans delivering to sixteen local villages on a weekly basis, as did Hopgoods of Stowmarket, Stiffs of Kersey and Partridges of Hadleigh.

#### The Suffolk Walking Festival returns

Tickets are on sale now for The Suffolk Walking Festival as it returns in 2022 for its 14<sup>th</sup> instalment.

The festival, which launches on 14 May 2022 at Clare Country Park, boasts over 70 guided walks that will take you across wild countryside, outstanding landscapes, rolling hills, forests, and coastal beauty spots. With lots of weekend, evening and family walks. The programme has accessible, short, medium, long-distance walks, and more challenging walks – so there is something for everyone.

This year's programme will discover a dragon in the iconic Stour Valley, explore Hawkedon's horizons through idyllic green villages, celebrate 75 years at RSPB, tell stories of smugglers and shipping routes at Dunwich Heath, and spend time watching Sweep the sheepdog in action managing Orford Ness Nature Reserve's very own herd of rare breed sheep.

You can tune into bats on a twilight safari through ancient woodland at Priestley Wood, brush up your whittling skills and make damper bread over an open fire in the woods at Thornham Walks, and get crafty at Brandon Country Park finding willow, sticks, leaves and rushes in the woods to make and keep your own creations.

### Councillor Paul West, Suffolk County Council's cabinet member for Ipswich, operational highways and flooding, said:

"It is a fantastic achievement to see The Suffolk Walking Festival reach its fourteenth year, holding its title as one of the longest running festivals of its kind in the UK. It is unfortunate that the festival in 2020 had to be cancelled, and in 2021 it took place virtually; so it is very exciting to see the festival return in full.

"The festival grows in popularity each year with its vast variety of walks and events. It shows off some of Suffolk's most beautiful scenery which makes up part of the 3,500 miles of public rights of way across the county.

"These events remain a great way to keep active and meet others. I would encourage everyone to get out there and explore."

#### **Nature Notes**

Recent research carried out by Bristol University has found that garden size is not the most important factor for pollinators. Insects that have the opportunity to forage over many gardens in which there are a wide range of plants is what makes the difference. By foraging across many gardens, with diverse plants that flower at different times of the year, the pollinating insects have access to a continuous and reliable food supply. In nearly 500 surveys across 59 gardens more than 600 plant types were recorded.

Gardens in affluent areas tended to produce more nectar sugar but larger gardens did not. They have the potential to supply more nectar sugar but this is not often realised because they can have a larger proportion of non-nectar-rich lawn. Smaller gardens packed with plants are more beneficial.

The research also looked into flower structure. Some flowers, such as fuchsias and salvias have long corolla tubes which only feed insects with long tongues, thus making the food inaccessible to many insects. Growing plants with single or open flowers allow a wider range of insects to reach the centres of the flowers.

Here are some plants that flower in the winter you may wish to include in your garden; winter aconite, hellebore and purpose honeysuckle. Some spring suggestions; bugle, bergenia, native primrose and the common cowslip. Summer choices; yarrow, canterbury bells, cornflower and foxglove. For the Autumn; dahlia,









michaelmas daisy and chrysanthemum. For a far more comprehensive list including trees, shrubs and bulbs go to

Of flames, a shadow that's gone astray, and is lost.





#### Rambling with Gus

Hitcham loop: approx. 2 1/4 miles, approx. 1 hour, starts near the Post Office.

This is a short walk, mainly on grassy paths, following field headlands with views towards Wattisham. There is even a seat part way round, a good spot to relax and take in the scenery.

For added interest, you may wish to take a detour into the magnificent Hitcham church. In the church you will find a display about the Rev John Henslow who



was Rector here from 1837—1861. Henslow was a great friend and mentor to Charles Darwin.

To start the walk, if arriving by car, park in the cul-de-sac opposite the Post Office. The footpath starts on the opposite side of the road to the Post Office and to the right of the cul-de-sac. This path follows the field hedges for approx. 1/2 a mile before coming to a T junction with another path in a small copse. Turn right and follow the path which will lead you to a quiet road. Turn right onto the road. After approx. 500 metres take the footpath on the right, this takes you back to the main Hitcham road at Squirrels coach yard. Turn right onto the road and cross over. At the bottom of the hill take the footpath to the right. This winds past cottage gardens before opening out into a wildflower meadow. Half way along the meadow, take the path to the right across a small bridge. This takes you back to the Post Office where

#### **Motoring Memories, Part XI**

Stuart's motoring memories are drawn from his childhood in the 1960s and 70s growing up in Bretttenham where his father ran a village shop and filling station. This month Stuart reflects on advanced driving skills.

#### **Making Progress**

I had read about schemes to promote improved driving beyond the basic test but until 1989 I had not followed this up. However, after getting involved initially I am still going, thirty years later. There are two main charities promoting advanced driving, which are RoadSmart IAMRoadsmart (institute of Advanced Motorists



Roadsmart) and ROADAR (ROSPA Advanced Drivers and Riders) and I now volunteer with both to assist other people to improve or progress their driving. Both organisations base their training on the emergency services system of driving and the handbook is called Roadcraft. The latest edition published this year is easier to understand and is jargon free. After undergoing training with an "observer" a test is taken. This takes around an



hour and is based on the principles in Roadcraft. On average ten hours of training is required for people to be prepared for the test, dependent on how quickly the person picks up the skills. The main purpose of the training is for people to improve their skills, road safety and thus

make it safer for everybody, and reduce injuries and fatalities.

In 1989 I took both tests and successfully passed. The next thing, I was being asked to take over observing a Road Safety Officer who had her test in a few weeks. I had no training as an Observer and there was an assumption I would be able to help. It is very different now with Observers being tested regularly on their own driving skills and ability to undertake the coaching.

Over the past thirty years I have coached around 130 people to test level. Mostly an enjoyable experience with a few exceptions. A few scary and funny events.

A Spanish lady wanted to follow her husband's example and take the test. Two major issues were that her ability to understand English was not well honed. Secondly she did not enjoy driving and drove infrequently, but when she did so felt that going everywhere as fast as possible would be best. As an Observer, training people takes place in their car. I only have words and gestures to manage the situation, unlike a Driving Instructor, there are no dual controls. On this occasion the Spanish lady had decided to overtake a lorry on a single carriage way road. Bear in mind overtaking is the most dangerous manoeuvre. A car was coming towards us but was still far enough away to be of no concern. The lady now decided to completely change her usual style and complete the overtake ....slowly. I calmly advised her to speed up. Her inability to grasp firstly what I had said, and secondly the developing danger was evident. I do not speak any Spanish, but with the increasing danger my voice getting louder, somehow the urgency of the situation became evident. Perhaps my gestures helped, or maybe that international language of four letters was understood. I was quite relieved we survived. The lady did eventually decide that following her husband was not a good idea, I agreed. Some thirty years later I still occasionally bump into her and we laugh about the incident.

Vauxhall had a link with IAMRoadsmart some years ago whereby they offered a night driving assessment, which was undertaken by IAM observers. A gentleman arrived at my house for the assessment. In those days I lived in quite a narrow, dead end residential town street with cars parked on both sides of the road. After initial introductions, checking documentation and a discussion about the event we got into the gentleman's car. He drove to the dead end of the street, promptly engaged reverse gear and without hesitation or deviation drove as fast backwards to the other end as possible. I pondered quitting whilst ahead but being of an inquisitive nature decided to carry on with the assessment. It was evident that this individual was highly trained, demonstrated some very advanced skills and was extremely safe, smooth and progressive in his driving. There was nothing I would have been able to add. I told him this after we concluded and then asked about his experience and why the assessment. He was trained in the Special Forces, ambush avoidance being a specialty. He had come to IAM to do the assessment due to a disagreement with another observer, who had refused to accept that this gentleman had the skills he stated. I was quite happy to acknowledge that his level of training, skill and experience exceeded mine, my IAM colleague sadly could not bring himself to do so.

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
